Subject	Law: Criminal Law
	You will be required to teach <u>Criminal Law</u> to first year students.
	You will provide an average of six hours teaching per week during the eight weeks of Michaelmas Term 2023, and set and mark internal college exams at the start of Hilary Term 2024. You will also be expected to participate in the College's undergraduate Admissions process in December. All of our teaching is in small groups (usually tutorials of two students and classes of around six). This is a part-time role.

Duties	You will be involved in the teaching, academic administration and pastoral care of Pembroke's Law students. This will include:
	 Delivering the teaching of Pembroke College undergraduates in the relevant subjects. Setting and marking Collections (internal College exams) to a deadline in 2nd week of term. Writing end of term reports on the performance of your undergraduates using the web-based system. Liaising as required with other Fellows and Lecturers in the subject, as regards the teaching of your undergraduates and with other College staff about addressing any pastoral problems which may arise amongst your students. Participating in termly student review meetings and attending the Master's Academic Review for undergraduate admissions exercise. Taking part in College open days and any other access activities in your subject area. Attending College events for undergraduates and graduates and entertaining the students in your subject as organised within that subject.
Salary	The salary for the teaching will be in the range of £4,727- £5,558 for six hours teaching in one academic term, depending on experience and qualifications.

Selection criteria	 In possession of a doctorate degree in Law or in at least the second year of doctoral study. Relevant teaching experience and ability to teach the paper listed above. Willing and able to undertake the administrative and pastoral duties set out above.

About Pembroke College	Pembroke College was founded in 1624 and occupies attractive buildings in central Oxford. 	The College has an undergraduate body of about 350, around 200 graduates, and 30 Visiting Students. The College admits between 5 and 7 undergraduates a year to read Law (Jurisprudence), including students on the Law with Law Studies in Europe course and 2 nd BA students. We offer two fully funded DPhil scholarships in Law and the scholarship holders are part of the teaching community in college.
Right to work	Appointment to this post is dependent on the candidate demonstrating that they have the right to work in the UK. At all times your employment is subject to the provision of original documentation to establish your right to work and remain in the UK, which the College requires in order to comply with its duties under the Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Act 2006. It will remain your responsibility to ensure that you are able to produce such documentation as and when requested from you.
	This role will not attract sufficient points to obtain a sponsored visa under the points based immigration system, however applications are welcome from candidates who do not currently have the right to work in the UK, but who would be eligible to obtain a visa via another route.
