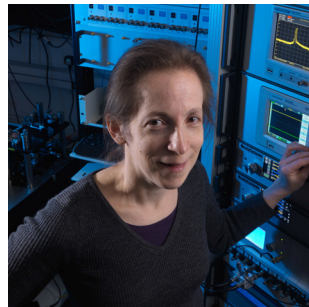


Photographic Portraits in Hall: 2023

Helen Margolis (m.1987 - Physics)

Helen Margolis is the Head of Science for Time & Frequency at the National Physical Laboratory (NPL) and an NPL Fellow in Optical Frequency Standards and Metrology. She joined NPL in 1998 following a temporary lectureship at the University of Oxford, where she worked on a range of experiments designed to test the theory of quantum electrodynamics by spectroscopy of highly charged ions. An undergraduate at Pembroke, she went on to postgraduate study in Oxford, being awarded the DPhil degree in 1994.

Helen's specialist area of research expertise is optical frequency metrology using femtosecond combs, part of NPL's research programme to develop a new generation of high accuracy optical atomic clocks based on laser-cooled trapped ions and atoms. She is the coordinator of a European project: Robust Optical Clocks for International Timescales (ROCIT), and the Technical Authority for the National Timing Centre programme.

Helen represents NPL on various international committees, including the Consultative Committee for Time and Frequency (CCTF) and several of its working groups. She is the current chair of the Executive Committee of the European Frequency and Time Forum and a member of the CODATA Task Group on Fundamental Constants. She has been a Visiting Professor at the University of Oxford since 2017 and was awarded an MBE in 2019 for her services to metrology.



Vivienne Artz (m.1987 - Philosophy & Theology)

Vivienne is the President of Women in Banking and Finance, and is a recognized gender champion and leader having been awarded a) the "Champion for Women" Award at the Women in Banking and Finance Awards for Achievement 2016, and b) the 2019 WeAreTheCity Rising Star "Editor's Choice" Award in recognition of her efforts in the diversity space. Vivienne was awarded "Woman Solicitor of the Year" in the Law Society Excellence Awards in 2020, and has many years of experience leading a broad range of diversity initiatives and groups both within firms and across sectors. She was recognised in the Queen's 2020 New Year's Honours list with an OBE for services to financial services and gender diversity.

Until January 2021 Vivienne was the Chief Privacy Officer at Refinitiv, leading the global Privacy Office and overseeing global privacy strategy and practice. Previously, Vivienne was a Managing Director and Global Head of Privacy Legal and Head of International for the Intellectual Property and Technology Law Group at Citi. Prior to joining Citi in 2000, Vivienne worked in private practice in London.

Vivienne chairs the International Regulatory Strategy Group Data Working Group, is on TheCityUK EU Technical Advisory Group, and is the Vice-Chair on the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the International Association of Privacy Professionals (IAPP). Vivienne is also on the Business and Law Advisory Board of St Mary's University in the UK and is on the Founding Editorial Board for the Journal of AI and Ethics. She currently sits in Pembroke's Alumni Advisory Board.

Erin Kennedy (m. 2011 - History & English)

Erin was PCBC and OUWBC Cox and JCR Access Rep. She was Cox of the victorious Oxford women's blue boat in 2014 and later joined Leander Club in Henley-on-Thames. March 2017 saw her steer a women's eight of returning Olympians to victory at the Women's Eights Head of the River Race.

She moved across to trial for the Paralympic programme in the 2018 season and was selected for the World Championships in Plovdiv, Bulgaria. Erin coxed the crew to their eighth consecutive World Championship gold medal.

Erin was once again selected for the coxing seat for the 2019 Season and steered the crew to two gold medals in May at the International Para Rowing Regatta in Gavirate, Italy. At the 2019 World Championships, the PR3Mix4+ dominated the field to win the event by 12 seconds.

A double World Champion, European Champion, and world record holder, Eric won Paralympic gold in September 2021 when the boat she coxed cruised to victory in the PR3 mixed four.



David Titterington (m.1977 - Music)

David Titterington was Organ Scholar at Pembroke College before continuing his organ studies at the Conservatoire de Rueil-Malmaison in Paris, where he won a 'premier prix à l'unanimité avec les félicitations du jury'; he later studied with distinguished Czech composer Petr Eben.

Throughout his career, David has worked closely with many composers across a wide range of styles, and with many distinguished soloists and orchestras. He has appeared in recitals and concertos at major festivals worldwide, including the BBC Proms, the Bicentennial Festival of Sydney and the international festivals of Hong Kong, New Zealand and Tokyo and, for eighteen years, he gave annual masterclasses and recitals at the Dartington International Summer School & Festival.

David is currently Head of Organ at the Royal Academy of Music, Artistic Director of St Albans International Organ Festival and a Professor of the University of London.

He has been awarded numerous honours and awards, including Fellowship of the Royal College of Organists, a Doctorate and Honorary Professorship of the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music in Budapest and honorary doctorates from the Universities of Huddersfield and Bolton. David is also an Honorary Member of the Royal Academy of Music, was elected a Fellow Commoner of Sidney Sussex College Cambridge in 2016 and an Honorary Fellow of King's College London in 2018.



Kirkland Newman Smulders (m.1990 - Modern Languages)

Kirkland Newman Smulders is a writer, entrepreneur and philanthropist focussed on mental health as well as the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. She is the Founder and Editor of MindHealth360, an online service which provides a free, comprehensive source of information and resources on mental health. She is setting up The London Integrative Mental Health Clinic to provide integrative mental health services. Kirkland is also co-founder and trustee of the Horizon Foundation, a charity which funds students from the Middle East and Asia to attend schools, and sometimes universities in the UK and US.

After studying for her degree in Modern Languages at Pembroke, she obtained an MSc in European Studies from the London School of Economics and Political Science, and an MA in Near and Middle Eastern Studies from the School of Oriental and African Studies. She has worked for Rockefeller Brothers Fund and Ogilvy & Mather in New York, for the Prince's Trust in London and was co-chair and trustee for Lessons with Love, a charity which supported refugee communities in Bethlehem. She also published a chapter entitled 'The Battle over Victimhood; roles and implications of narratives of suffering in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict' in Dina Matar and Zahera Harb's Narrating Conflict in the Middle East: Discourse, Image and Communication Practices in Lebanon and Palestine (2013).



Gordon Rayner (m.1988 - English)

Gordon Rayner is currently Associate Editor of The Daily Telegraph where he has been since 2007 when he joined as Chief Reporter and then, in 2017, became Political Editor. He started his career at the Banbury Guardian, then spent a year at the International News Service press agency in Reading before a four-year spell at The Sun and nine years at The Daily Mail. He was part of The Daily Telegraph's team which broke the story of the MPs' expenses scandal, in 2009, and co-authored a book about it entitled No Expenses Spared (with Robert Winnett, 2009). He has covered many of the biggest stories of recent years and has also travelled extensively, reporting from more than twenty countries. He has been short-listed for three "Scoop of the Year" awards at the British Press Awards and has won other prizes for his work. He describes himself as a 'long-suffering Newcastle United fan'.
