This photograph shows most of those students who came up to Pembroke in the Michaelmas Term of 1912. We have taken a look at this one matriculation year, whose students were greatly affected by the war, and explored the fates of those who returned from the war or who were not required to serve.

Out of the 27 men who matriculated, eight lost their lives in the war and can be found in the Roll of Honour section of this website:

Eleven served in the British forces and survived the war:

Bryars, William Duke: A King Charles I Scholar at Pembroke, Bryars served as a Sergeant in

the Royal Army Medical Corps and went on to work in the Bank of

British West Africa.

Cullen, Arthur Armstrong: A Foundation Scholar, Cullen obtained his BA in 1919. He served as a

lieutenant in the 7<sup>th</sup> Leinster Regiment and he was awarded the military MBE. He went on to become an official in the Government

of Nigeria.

Eck, Cyril Richard: Originally from South Africa, he served as an observer with the Royal

Flying Corps. Eck died in 1924.

Edwards, Clement Victor: Edwards obtained his BA and MA in 1920. A 2<sup>nd</sup> lieutenant with the

3<sup>rd</sup> Suffolk Regiment, afterwards a corporal with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, he was invalided on 31 March 1916 but later re-enlisted. After the war, he held various clerical positions including Vicar of Stalham, Norfolk, Rector of St. George's, Manchester, and

Vicar of Mareham-le-Fen, Lincolnshire. He died in 1969.

Holford, William Francis: A lieutenant with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Queen's (RW Surrey Regiment) attached to

the 6<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Brigade, he served in India and Mesopotamia and

went on to be a schoolmaster at Strode School, Surrey.

Marsh, Ronald Joseph: A Morley Scholar, Marsh obtained his BA and MA in 1920. Originally

with the surname Marx (as seen on the photograph), he changed his name by deed poll. A lieutenant with the  $1/7^{th}$  Essex Regiment, he served in Egypt and Palestine and went on to a career with the

Inland Revenue. He died in 1965

Outhwaite, Frederick Oswald: A lieutenant with the 7<sup>th</sup> Northumberland Fusiliers, he was awarded

the MC in 1917. He became vicar of Glasshoughton, Yorkshire, in

1927 where he served until his death in 1953.

Philipson, Hilton: A lieutenant with the Scots Guard, he went into politics and was

briefly MP for Berwick-upon-Tweed. He died in 1941.

Stone, Henry John: Stone obtained his BA in 1914 and his MA in 1917. A lieutenant with

the 10<sup>th</sup> Queen's (RW Surrey Regiment), he was awarded the MC in 1918. He became vicar of Godshill on the Isle of Wight from 1932.

Weir, Robert: A sapper with the Royal Engineers and a private with the 463<sup>rd</sup>

Agricultural Company, he became a lecturer at Aberdeen University. Yeates obtained his BA in 1916 and his MA in 1920. A 2<sup>nd</sup> lieutenant with the 11<sup>th</sup> Essex Regiment, he became headmaster of Tientsin

School in China until his retirement due to ill health in 1937. He returned to Oxford at worked as secretary to the Headmaster of the

City of Oxford School until his death in 1955.

And those who do not appear in the Roll of Service:

Yeates, Sydney:

Maddox, John Lawrence Maddox does not appear in the University Roll of Honour as having

served. As a member of the Plymouth Brethren, and, therefore, a conscientious objector, he was attached to No.1 Company,

Aldershot, a non-combatant corps. He went on to become a doctor.

Gruenwald, Alfred Ferdinand From Stettin, then part of Germany, Gruenwald became a painter

and poet who worked under the name Johannes Theodor Baargeld and was one of the founders of the Cologne Dada Group. He served as a reserve lieutenant in the German Army during the war and subsequently completed his University education in Cologne. He died

in 1927 while climbing in the Alps.

Egerer, Otto Vincent: A Hungarian pianist and teacher, he was attached to Pembroke, aged

47, while a student of Music. His name was removed from the

College books on 27<sup>th</sup> Nov 1913. He died in 1935. He does not appear

in the photo.

Raisman, Abraham Jeremy An Oades and Stafford Scholar, Raisman obtained his 1<sup>st</sup> class BA in

Classics in 1915 and his MA in 1945. He entered the Indian Civil Service in 1916 and, on his return to England in 1947, was appointed to various executive positions including the vice-chairmanship of Lloyds Bank from 1947 to 1953. He was an honorary fellow of Pembroke and of Leeds University and, among many honours, was

knighted in 1939. He died in 1978.

Hon. Sho Sho Sho was the grandson of the last King of Ryukyu (now Okinawa).

He left Oxford without taking any examinations.

Smyth, Bernard Bradley Bond Smyth obtained his 3<sup>rd</sup> class BA in Jurisprudence in 1915 and served

with the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve. He went on to become a

schoolmaster and died in 1986.

Beckley, Leslie Stewart Ratliffe Beckley obtained a 3<sup>rd</sup> class BA in Theology in 1916 and his MA in

1919.

Clark, Ernest George Victor Clark took over the running of Clark's College, Chancery Lane, which

had been established in 1880 by his father, George Clark, who died in 1919. It is likely that this resulted in an exemption from service for Ernest who was his only son. He was awarded the Freedom of the

City of London in 1916 and died in 1973.
