Approved by Visitor June 12, 1915

PEMBROKE COLLEGE, OXFORD.

EMERGENCY STATUTE.

WHEREAS at a General Meeting of the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College held on Monday, 24 May, 1915, in accordance with the provisions of the *Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877*, section 54, and under powers conferred by the *Universities and Colleges (Emergency Powers) Act, 1915*, it was resolved by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the number of the persons present and voting to make an Emergency Statute, the College enacts as follows:—

1. As from the 4th day of August nineteen hundred and fourteen the Master and Fellows shall have power:—
 - (1) To postpone until any date not later than the end of the emergency period the election or admission to any fellowship, scholarship, prize, or other office or emolument in the College;
 - (2) To suspend until any date not later than the end of the emergency period any such fellowship, scholarship, prize, office, or emolument as may be or may become vacant;
 - (3) To apply to any purpose relative to the College any moneys which may be undisposed of by reason of any such postponement or suspension as aforesaid;
 - (4) To suspend or modify in the interests of the holder thereof until any date not later than the end of the emergency period any conditions as to residence, duties, or otherwise affecting the tenure or emoluments of any fellowship, scholarship, prize, or other office in the College;
 - (5) To suspend or modify until any date not later than the expiration of one year after the end of the emergency period any provision relating to the age or university standing at which any person is eligible as a candidate for any scholarship, prize, or other emolument in the College;

- (6) Until any date not later than the expiration of one year after the end of the emergency period, in the election to any scholarship, prize, or other emolument in the College, to take into account the fact that any person offering himself as a candidate has been engaged during the present war in the naval or military service of the Crown, or in some other service of the Crown connected with the present war or in any work abroad of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, or any body with similar objects, or has been made a prisoner of war;
- (7) To extend the length of tenure of any scholarship, exhibition, prize, or other emolument, in the College, in the case of any person who has been engaged during the present war in any such service or work, or who has been made a prisoner of war or detained by His Majesty's enemies in consequence of the present war;
- (8) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the corporate revenue or other fund applicable to the statutory purposes of the College to the Tuition Fund of the College;
- (9) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the income of any fund applicable to any statutory purposes of the College, so far as the income is not required for the purposes of that fund, to any fund applicable to some other statutory purposes of the College;
- (10) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the corporate revenue or other fund applicable to the statutory purposes of the College for the relief and assistance of members of the College engaged during the present war in the naval or military service of the Crown, or in some other service of the Crown connected with the present war or in any work abroad of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, or any body with similar objects;

- (11) To make such provisions of a similar nature to any of the foregoing as may seem to be required to prevent or mitigate loss or injustice, and to meet exigencies due to circumstances attributable directly or indirectly to the present war;

and the power hereby granted shall be deemed to include any incidental, supplemental or consequential powers which may appear necessary or expedient for affecting any such purposes as aforesaid.

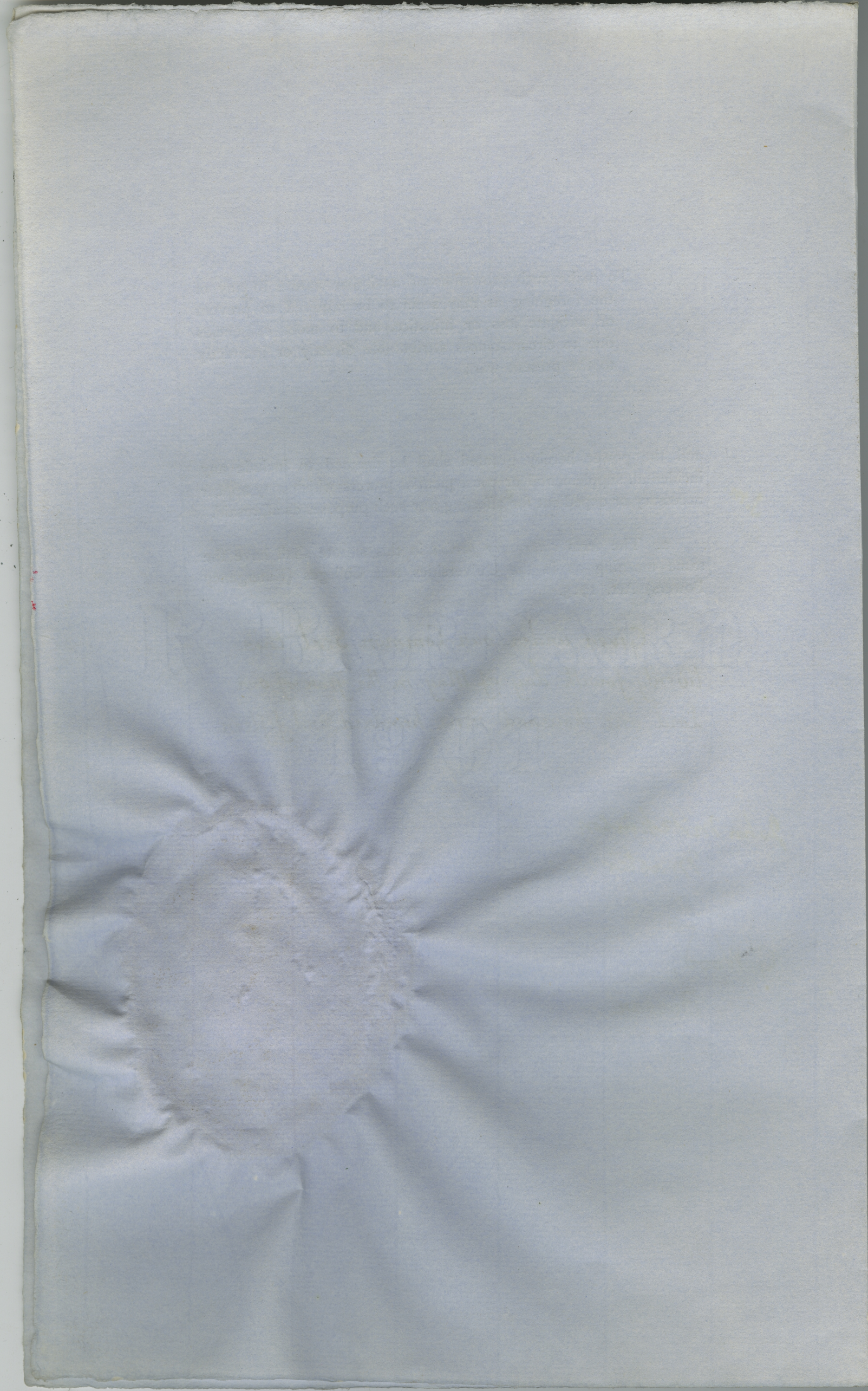

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1. As from the 4th day of August nineteen hundred and fourteen the Master and Fellows shall have power:—

- (1) To postpone until any date not later than the end of the emergency period the election or admission to any fellowship, scholarship, prize, or other office or emolument in the College;
- (2) To suspend until any date not later than the end of the emergency period any such fellowship, scholarship, prize, office, or emolument as may be or may become vacant;
- (3) To apply to any purpose relative to the College any moneys which may be undisposed of by reason of any such postponement or suspension as aforesaid;
- (4) To suspend or modify in the interests of the holder thereof until any date not later than the end of the emergency period any conditions as to residence, duties, or otherwise affecting the tenure or emoluments of any fellowship, scholarship, prize, or other office in the College;
- (5) To suspend or modify until any date not later than the expiration of one year after the end of the emergency period any provision relating to the age or university standing at which any person is eligible as a candidate for any scholarship, prize, or other emolument in the College;

- (6) Until any date not later than the expiration of one year after the end of the emergency period, in the election to any scholarship, prize, or other emolument in the College, to take into account the fact that any person offering himself as a candidate has been engaged during the present war in the naval or military service of the Crown, or in some other service of the Crown connected with the present war or in any work abroad of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, or any body with similar objects, or has been made a prisoner of war ;
- (7) To extend the length of tenure of any scholarship, exhibition, prize, or other emolument, in the College, in the case of any person who has been engaged during the present war in any such service or work, or who has been made a prisoner of war or detained by His Majesty's enemies in consequence of the present war ;
- (8) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the corporate revenue or other fund applicable to the statutory purposes of the College to the Tuition Fund of the College ;
- (9) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the income of any fund applicable to any statutory purposes of the College, so far as the income is not required for the purposes of that fund, to any fund applicable to some other statutory purposes of the College ;
- (10) To make payments until any date not later than the end of the emergency period out of the corporate revenue or other fund applicable to the statutory purposes of the College for the relief and assistance of members of the College engaged during the present war in the naval or military service of the Crown, or in some other service of the Crown connected with the present war or in any work abroad of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, or any body with similar objects ;

- (II) To make such provisions of a similar nature to any of the foregoing as may seem to be required to prevent or mitigate loss or injustice, and to meet exigencies due to circumstances attributable directly or indirectly to the present war;

and the power hereby granted shall be deemed to include any incidental, supplemental or consequential powers which may appear necessary or expedient for ^effecting any such purposes as aforesaid.

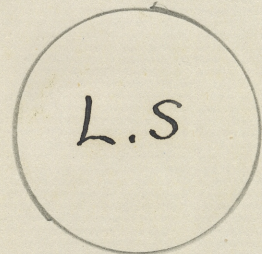

The first step in the process of a scientific inquiry is to
formulate a hypothesis or a question to be investigated. It is
essential that the hypothesis or question be clearly stated and
that it be testable. The next step is to design an experiment
to test the hypothesis or question. This involves determining
the variables to be studied and the methods to be used.

The experiment should be designed so that the results can be
measured and compared with the hypothesis or question. It is
important to control the variables as much as possible to
ensure that the results are due to the factor being studied.

After the experiment is completed, the results should be
analyzed and compared with the hypothesis or question. If the
results support the hypothesis or question, then the hypothesis
or question is accepted. If the results do not support the
hypothesis or question, then the hypothesis or question is
rejected.

The scientific method is a systematic way of investigating
the natural world. It is a process that involves making
observations, formulating hypotheses, testing hypotheses, and
drawing conclusions. The scientific method is used by scientists
in all fields of science to discover new knowledge about the
natural world.
